

Obstacle Course

Event Hours: 2 **Best Time to Conduct:** Any time of day

BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF EVENT – Set up obstacle course for riders to drive the pedal kart or trike while distracted or impaired

Items Needed

Distractions could be:

- A rider's phone. Ask them to type in a paragraph into their messenger app. i.e. Pledge of Allegiance; a nursery rhyme, such as *Mary had a Little Lamb*; or other commonly known text.
- A handheld game that can be performed with one hand.
- Someone on the side of the obstacle course holding up a series of signs that the rider must look at, remember, and recite at the end of the course.

Impairments could be:

- Drunk goggles (Fatal Vision Goggles).
- Arm or leg weights on one side of the body (drugs can often impair coordination).
- Safety glasses with smeared Vasoline on inside of lenses.
- Hazards, such as Traffic Signs, pictures, cones, caution tape
- Tape or chalk to mark the obstacle course
- Large Scoreboard
- TDS Volunteers in their TDS t-shirt
- Adult supervision

Steps

- 1. Speak with your TDS sponsor and principal of school to select a date, place and time to conduct event.
- 2. Promote the event around school through flyers or over announcements.
- 3. Before the day of the event, the student leader(s) should confirm the event with principal and make sure to have all the required TDS items.
- 4. The day of the event, TDS volunteers should be wearing TDS t-shirts.
- 5. Create an obstacle course:
 - Place hazards in the obstacle course that the rider must avoid. If you make these movable, you can also move them around to make it more challenging.
 - o If using a Trike, read the CAUTION section below.

- 6. Ask the rider to go through the course with the distraction/impairment first. Count the hazards they hit. Then, ask the rider to go through the course again without distractions/impairments, challenging them to beat their score.
- 7. If they get through the course distraction/impairment-free without hitting any hazards, write their name on a large scoreboard.
- 8. Place information in the area where students are waiting for their turn. Or, conduct smaller safety activities to keep students occupied while in line.
- 9. Take pictures to send to us, post on social media and your school website!
- 10. Complete an activity form on t-driver.com under the "Be Involved" tab to earn TDS Cup points. *If in Texas, submit affidavit or sign in sheets as well.*

Don't Forget

Remind students the risks of distracted / impaired driving. Connect the activity to a lesson. Ensure the rider understands that the risky task they are experiencing is on a closed track so they can learn how distractions/impairment cause the rider to perform a task worse than if there were no distraction/impairment. These poor performances can also happen while driving if they choose to drive distracted or impaired, but with much worse results.

Follow-up questions:

- Watching other riders, would you be able to tell if they were distracted/impaired just by the way they were operating the trike?
- O What are some ways to AVOID distracted/impaired driving?
- What would you do if the person you were riding with started driving distracted or began drinking/taking drugs?

Make it GREAT

- Reach out to your local media to inform them of the impact you're making.
- Contact the local police department and ask them to give a presentation about the consequences of driving under the influence.
- For fun: you can issue traffic tickets to those who could not maneuver around the obstacle without hitting a cone or going out of the boundary.

Trike Caution

Please be aware that rounding corners fast may cause the trike to overturn. For a safe event

- Ask rider to remain upright on the trike do not lean forward, to one side, or back.
- Do not allow riders to build up speed before a turn and Keep obstacle course in small areas to avoid riders being able to build up speed.
- Do not time the riders. Score the rider by ability to stay between lines or avoiding hazards.
- Schools may also choose to purchase a helmet for riders as an extra safety precaution.
- An adult should always supervise the use of the trike.
