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## Identifying Impaired Driving

#### Drugged driving is more complicated than drunk driving.

Number: Hundreds of drugs Alcohol is alcohol

Use by Drivers, Presence in Crashes: Limited Data Abundant Data

Use by Drivers: Increasing Decreasing

Impairment: Varies by type Well-documented

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# Effects of Alcohol

The first part of the brain alcohol impacts is higher level thinking = less ability to think through impactful decisions.

Alcohol also impacts vision muscle control.

#### Teens and Alcohol

Teens are 17x more likely to be involved in a crash after drinking.

Drivers are less likely to use restraints when they have been drinking.

Most of those killed in alcohol-related crashes involving teen drivers are the young drivers themselves and their passengers.

According to a TxDOT study, first-time offenders can expect to pay between \$5,000 and \$24,000 for DWI (Driving While Intoxicated) arrest and conviction.



# Effects of Marijuana

Drugs most commonly used by 12<sup>th</sup> graders (in order): tobacco, alcohol and marijuana, painkillers.

Driving under the influence of marijuana will earn a DUI.

Marijuana will significantly impair judgment, motor coordination, and reaction time.

### Teens and Marijuana

Marijuana is by far the most common drug found in roadside surveys, and found in fatally injured drivers.

Perceived risk has fallen dramatically since 2004.

A DUI can mean losing your drivers license, scholarships, and future job prospects.



#### TDS Team Outreach Ideas

- Prom Promise
- Role play ways to talk to peers about alcohol and drug use
- Activities showing physical effects of impairments / discuss inability to drive while impaired
- Discuss misconceptions of recreational drugs
- Encourage teens to discuss risks with parents or trusted adult - make a pact to have plan in case teen needs an 'out' in a situation or a ride
