

Teens in the Driver Seat® (TDS) is a peer-to-peer program that educates teens about the top five dangers of teen driving — distractions, such as cell phones and teen passengers; driving at night/fatigue; speeding and street racing; not wearing a seat belt; and driving after alcohol/drug use. Since 2002, the program has won more than 20 awards and enjoyed best practice program recognition on multiple occasions from entities such as the United States Department of Transportation (USDOT), the Governors Highway Safety Administration and the National Safety Council.

In 2022, TDS celebrated its 20-year anniversary and will provide more than 350 schools with the opportunity to provide empowering, results-driven community service to help make roads safer across the United States.

"I founded this program on the notion that students themselves should be actively involved in the solution and give year-round attention to reducing injuries and fatalities for those using our transportation system," said Russell Henk, TDS Program Founder. "While that is still the core focus of programming, TDS has evolved over the last 20 years. With the age of social media and the onset of smartphones, we developed an incentive-based safe-driving app, You in the Driver Seat (YDS). I am so very grateful for the incredible support we have received thus far from numerous sponsors/partners and the dozens of Texas A&M Transportation Institute (TTI) staff — past and present — that have contributed to this program's success."

Since its inception in Texas, TDS has expanded to over 2.5 million student drivers in more than 1,800 schools. Depending on sponsorship, TDS has reached a total of 38 states over the program's lifetime and currently supports 25 different states, with lots of online learning materials free to anyone thanks to both public- and private-sector partnerships.

What do the next 20 years look like, you ask? "Mobility for young people is continually evolving, and it's important for our program to focus on meeting these needs to ensure that they're safe no matter how they use our roads," said Lisa Minjares-Kyle, TDS program manager. "While our

vision remains the same — to ensure youth live long and healthy lives through safe practices on our roads — it is important to recognize the systemic issues that can impact communities and work to proactively address them. Only then can we hope to make progress toward zero young lives lost on our nation's roads."

PROGRAMS

TDS ALL-STARS

Est. 2011

What began as the TDS Cup in 2011 then evolved into the All-Stars. TDS manages an incentive program for schools active in spreading the safety message year-round. All-Stars is organized into risk units — distracted driving, nighttime drowsy driving, speeding, seat belt use, sharing the road, and impaired driving. TDS will reward student teams with cash — up to \$1,500 — as they complete each risk unit.



ZERO HERO

Est. 2014

Rebranded in 2021 to Zero Hero, this Toward Zero Deaths initiative is an activity that includes pre-observation, three weeks of activities/messaging, and post-observation. Teams may tackle increasing seat belt use, reducing distracted driving, and reducing distracted walking.

Observations are done to get a snapshot of the problem and to see if the team made a difference.

EXTRA MILE

Est. 2019

This program is an opportunity for high school seniors to go the Extra Mile doing traffic safety outreach in their school or community. Seniors show off their leadership skills by planning and leading three activities throughout the school year and are rewarded with a TDS graduation cord.

TEEN ADVISORY BOARD

Est. 2009

The board is made up of high school students who guide the future direction and content of the program. New program initiatives either originate from or are thoroughly vetted by the board prior to implementation. TDS's 67 board members (representing nine states) meet quarterly and at the annual TDS Summit.

SHARING THE ROAD

Est. 2017

This program is aimed at preventing young road user crashes through large truck, bus, railroad crossing, pedestrian, and bicycle safety education and resources for peer-to-peer outreach.









EVIDENCE OF HOPE

TDS developed at TTI has addressed teen driver behavior through peer-to-peer outreach for 20 years.

The TDS Program has produced positive results for young drivers on many occasions over the past 20 years. Following are some examples.

2006-2009

A three-year before-and-after case study of Garland ISD (which deployed TDS district-wide) showed a 92 percent decrease in fatal crashes, while the neighboring school district showed no change.

2010-2011

A statewide control group analysis in Texas showed counties that deployed TDS for three or more years averaged a 14.5 percent decrease in crashes involving injuries and fatalities.

2017-2019

A third-party statewide analysis in Nebraska showed significant improvements in seat belt use (and other young driver risks) at TDS Program schools.

2019-2020

A Colorado analysis aimed to understand the impact of TDS across schools since its implementation in 2014. Findings showed decreases in crashes for TDS schools that maintained the program for more than three years compared to one-year schools.

2019-2021

A review of self-reported driving behavior surveys showed improvements in multiple risky driving behaviors.

2020-2022

An analysis of young drivers showed a 20 percent decrease in distracted driving and a 15 percent higher driving score for those regularly using the YDS smartphone app.
